General Notes

- Canada is a country in the northern part of North America. It is the 2nd largest country by landmass. Canada is border by the U.S. which makes up the world's longest border.
- About 35 million people live in Canada (37th) making it sparsely populated. The majority of its land territory is dominated by forests and the Rocky Mountains.
- Ottawa is the capital city of Canada chosen by Queen Victoria in 1857.
- Canada has 10 provinces: Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Manitoba, British Columbia, Prince Edward Island, Saskatchewan, Alberta, Newfoundland/Labrador.

Flag

 The national flag of Canada consists of a red field with a white square at its center holding an 11-point maple leaf; however, the number of points on the leaf has no special significance.

Canada vs. US Size

- Canada's land area is about 3,855,000 square miles making it the 2nd largest county by landmass.
- The area of the US is 3,797,000 square miles by comparison making the United States slightly smaller than Canada. The US is the 3rd largest country by landmass.

Currency

- The Canadian Dollar is the official unit of currency in Canada.
- 1 CAD = \$0.80 USD

Landmarks

- Northern Lights: The northern lights are an aurora, which is a natural light display in the sky. Auroras are caused by electrons from solar winds that are attracted by magnetic fields. The electrons mix with the cold atmosphere gases creating the lights that we see.
- Niagara Falls: The Niagara Falls are located on the border of Ontario, Canada and New York, USA.
 - The Niagara Falls are made up of 3 waterfalls, the American Falls, the Bridal Veil Falls and the Horseshoe Falls.
 - It is illegal (and not very smart) to go over the Niagara Falls.
 - The Niagara Falls State Park is the oldest state park in the United States (1885).
 - The first tightrope walker to cross the Niagara Falls did so in 1859. (The Great Blondin; Charles Blondin; Emile Blondin; Jean-Francois Gravelet)
- Banff National Park: Banff National Park is Canada's oldest national park, established in 1885 in the Rocky Mountains.

- Ice Hockey: The contemporary sport of ice hockey was developed in Canada, most notably in Montreal, where the first indoor hockey game was played on March 3, 1875.


